Bay Area Clean Water Agencies (BACWA) – Is a local government agency created by a joint powers agreement in 1984. Its membership includes local clean water agencies that provide sanitary sewer services to the more than seven million people living in the nine county San Francisco Bay Area. BACWA was founded, and continues, to assist agencies in carrying out mutually beneficial projects, and to facilitate the development of scientific, economic and other information about the San Francisco Bay environment and the agencies that work to protect it and public health.

California Water Environment Association (CWEA) – CWEA is a statewide nonprofit public benefit association of about 9,100 wastewater professionals who are committed to keeping California's water clean. CWEA protects our water environment and the public's health by training and certifying wastewater professionals, disseminating technical information, and promoting sound policies to benefit society. CWEA is dedicated to the educational development of its members, who range from field level to management level. Most of CWEA's members (approximately 80 percent) work for wastewater agencies and collection systems, both large and small, throughout the state of California. CWEA offers services at the state level, regionally, and locally through its 17 geographical local sections.

Southern California Alliance of Publicly Owned Treatment Works (SCAP) – The Southern California Alliance of Publicly Owned Treatment Works (SCAP) is a nonprofit corporation organized to help ensure that regulations affecting POTWs and collection systems are reasonable and in the public's best interest. SCAP is currently comprised of more than 90 wastewater treatment and collection system agencies and one large regional water treatment agency. Together, its membership collects and/or treats the wastewater for more than 16 million southern Californians in seven counties. All of its non-associate members are public agencies, either municipalities or special districts, charged with the responsibility for treating and disposing of wastewater in a safe and economically viable manner for ratepayers. The mission of SCAP is to provide leadership, technical assistance and timely information to promote regulations that focus on the sustainable protection of the environment and public health.
